

We're mainly concerned with what others watch, than what we watch.




How people feel about media bias in others vs. themselves

A FREE PRESS: WHAT'S AT STAKE?


The Press Freedom Index by Reporters Without Borders ranks Norway number 1 worldwide in press freedoms, scoring 92 out of 100. North Korea scores 13, the Dominican Republic scores 70, and the U.S. scores just 65—ranking 57th in the world and falling fast.

Our freedoms face constant threats as corrupting political and economic forces pressure news coverage. Protect our rights: support independent journalism, fact-check everything, and hold ALL leaders accountable.



PERCEIVED ACCURACY AND BIAS IN THE NEWS MEDIA

Americans increasingly disagree on news source quality. Political views shape these perceptions, but research reveals verifiable differences in accuracy and bias across outlets. Fact-check before sharing.



HIDDEN WAYS TO SUPPRESS FREE SPEECH

In 2025 Craig Aaron, co-CEO of Free Press, a non-profit organization that is a watchdog for media freedoms, said the U.S. is "facing a true free-speech emergency"

INTERFERENCE THRIVES ON DIVISION

Foreign governments interfere in our elections by spreading polarizing messages, funding divisive content creators, and sowing distrust in news media.

When we amplify partisan views, we help our enemies weaken our republic. Don't let them polarize your views for profit.

SO WHAT CAN YOU DO? LOOK AT MEDIA THROUGH A NEW LENS

ocate Bias: Look for loaded language, source credibility, funding connections, and your own emotional reactions. Learn to recognize that bias exists everywhere—the goal is awareness, not avoidance.

E xtract Essentials: Examine articles to separate facts from opinions and identify core arguments. Eliminate rhetoric to expose substantiated claims and strip away hyperbole.

Note Omissions: Notice what context or counterevidence might be missing. Note potential motives and whether the content presents a complete picture.

Seek Sources: Search to verify claims with primary sources, expert consensus, and diverse viewpoints. Strengthen your understanding by consulting multiple news outlets.
